### Fund structure

The Fund is an authorised unit trust scheme under the Financial Services & Markets Act 2000 and also a UCITS scheme as defined by the Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook. The Fund is open-ended and issues Accumulation (Acc) and Income (Inc) units.

### Objective

The Fund's objective is to achieve a total return greater than that of the NSCI (XIC) over the long term by investing in a diversified portfolio of small UK quoted companies.


### Investment style: Value

Aberforth are value investors who buy shares in companies that they calculate to be selling below their intrinsic value. This is determined through detailed financial and industrial analysis, combined with a valuation approach that focuses on both stockmarket and corporate worth.

### Investment commentary

The NSCI (XIC) generated a total return of -1.9% in May. The FTSE All-Share fell by 3.0% – Vodafone's dividend cut highlighted the high income concentration among large companies. However, the bigger influence on returns was a re-emergence of fears about trade disputes and their implications for global growth. Against this backdrop, the value style continued to struggle and, for the fourth month in a row, style data showed value trailing growth. Despite the style headwind, the Fund outperformed the benchmark in producing a return of -1.0%. The size factor helped since "smaller small" companies, in which the Fund retains its over-weight, fared better than the larger constituents.


Among the winners, media company Future stands out. The company is successfully repositioning towards a digital business model – this illustrates that opportunities offered by disruption are not only the preserve of growth investors. Elsewhere, clothing retailer N Brown, logistics company Wincanton and property developer Urban&Civic reported good results. Meanwhile, PR company Huntsworth responded well to the acquisition of two healthcare research and communications businesses.

Performance was hindered by banknote printer De La Rue, with the share price falling in response to a profit warning and the departure of its CEO. Meanwhile, annuity provider Just Group weakened as concerns lingered about its investments in equity release mortgages and corporate debt.



## Data sources & calculations

All data supplied by Aberforth, except NSCI (XIC) data (from Numis/Paul Marsh and Elroy Dimson – London Business School) and FTSE data (from FTSE International Limited).

Performance returns are total returns after all expenses and assume reinvestment of dividends. Yield is based on the Fund's trailing 12 months dividends. Active share is a measure of how the Fund's portfolio differs from the NSCI (XIC). Small companies are represented by the NSCI (XIC). Large companies are represented by the FTAS.
