Objective

The Fund's objective is to provide Ordinary (Ord) shareholders with a high level of income, with the potential for income and capital growth, and to provide Zero Dividend Preference (ZDP) shareholders with a pre-determined final capital entitlement of 127.25p per ZDP share on the planned winding up date of 1 July 2024.


Investment style: Value

Aberforth are value investors who buy shares in companies that they calculate to be selling below their intrinsic value. This is determined through detailed financial and industrial analysis, combined with a valuation approach that focuses on both stockmarket and corporate worth.

Monthly investment commentary: January

The momentum reversal in asset prices was as swift as it was sharp in January. Stocks that performed poorly in 2022 have led the way up in 2023, so far. The markets' "risk-on" shift was prompted by indications that inflation has peaked. Comments emanating from the central banks went some way to support the hope for more modest interest rate rises and a less severe economic downturn.

UK stocks performed well, though the large caps, which proved so resilient in 2022, trailed small and midcaps. The FTSE 100 rose by 4.3%, the FTSE 250 by 5.4% and the NSCI (XIC) by 6.1%. The Fund's return was 4.3%.


Turning to stocks, **Wincanton** (logistics) and **Energean** (oil & gas) were the main negative contributors. The former provided underwhelming guidance for 2023, while the latter reported weaker than expected production figures. The brewer and beverage distributor **C&C Group** was another to report poor trading. Its sales of beer and cider into hospitality were hindered by the rail strikes over the festive period and the company signalled that the weak consumer environment was hampering trading.

Winners in the Fund included **Bakkavor** (food manufacturer) and **Centaur Media** (business publishing). Trading updates from both companies during the month were well-received, with Centaur boosted further by the announcement of a special dividend. The other notable winner was **Wilmington** (business publishing and training), which did not update during January but saw its strong share price performance of 2022 continue.

Gearing

The Fund's Ord shares are geared by the capital entitlement of the ZDP shares which will rise continuously until the planned winding up date of 1 July 2024. The net gearing figure shown in the Key Fund information section is the percentage by which the total value of investments exceeds the total net assets.



Data sources & calculations

Active share is a measure of how the Fund's portfolio differs from the NSCI (XIC). Small companies are represented by the NSCI (XIC). Large companies are represented by the FTAS.

In particular, should the Fund be wound up prior to its planned winding up date, holders of ZDPs would only receive their accrued capital entitlement to the date of winding up - which would be less than the final anticipated capital entitlement of the ZDPs.
