### Fund structure

The Fund is an authorised unit trust scheme under the Financial Services & Markets Act 2000 and also a UCITS scheme as defined by the Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook. The Fund is open-ended and issues Accumulation (Acc) and Income (Inc) units.

### Benchmark: NSCI (XIC)

The Fund's primary investment universe is the Numis Smaller Companies Index (excluding Investment Companies). It is used as a target and comparator benchmark. The FTSE All-Share Index is used as a comparator benchmark when reporting on the Fund's performance. The NSCI (XIC) index is rebalanced every January and its profile at the date of this Factsheet was:

The Fund's objective is to achieve a total return greater than that of the NSCI (XIC) over the long term by investing in a diversified portfolio of small UK quoted companies.


### Investment style: Value

Aberforth are value investors who buy shares in companies that they calculate to be selling below their intrinsic value. This is determined through detailed financial and industrial analysis, combined with a valuation approach that focuses on both stockmarket and corporate worth.

### Monthly investment commentary: January

The momentum reversal in asset prices was as swift as it was sharp in January. Stocks that performed poorly in 2022 have led the way up in 2023, so far. The markets' "risk-on" shift was prompted by indications that inflation has peaked. Comments emanating from the central banks went some way to support the hope for more modest interest rate rises and a less severe economic downturn.

UK stocks performed well, though the large caps, which proved so resilient in 2022, trailed small and mid-caps. The FTSE 100 rose by 4.3%, the FTSE 250 by 5.4% and the NSCI (XIC) by 6.1%. The Fund's performance was consistent with the theme of momentum reversal: having performed relatively well in 2022, its 5.1% gain in January was modestly behind that of the benchmark.


Turning to stocks, the broad momentum theme was also in evidence. Among the main detractors to the Fund's relative return were stocks that performed poorly enough in 2022 to enter the benchmark on 1 January. Following what was the index's largest ever rebalancing, non-holdings such as ASOS, Bridgepoint and Carnival bounced in January to the detriment of the Fund's relative performance. Meanwhile, among the holdings, **Wincanton** (logistics) gave underwhelming guidance for 2023 and **Energiean** (oil & gas) reported weaker than expected production figures.

Relative winners for the Fund included holdings in **Senior** (aerospace & automotive engineering) and **Card Factory** (greetings card retail). Both issued trading updates, reporting that 2022 had ended in a positive fashion.



## Data sources & calculations

All data supplied by Aberforth, except NSCI (XIC) data (from Numis/Paul Marsh and Elroy Dimson – London Business School) and FTSE data (from FTSE International Limited).

Performance returns are total returns after all expenses and assume reinvestment of dividends. Yield is based on the Fund's trailing 12 months' dividends. Active share is a measure of how the Fund's portfolio differs from the NSCI (XIC). Small companies are represented by the NSCI (XIC). Large companies are represented by the FTAS.
