The Fund's objective is to achieve a total return greater than that of the NSCI (XIC) over the long term by investing in a diversified portfolio of small UK quoted companies.


Investment style: Value

Aberforth are value investors who buy shares in companies that they calculate to be selling below their intrinsic value. This is determined through detailed financial and industrial analysis, combined with a valuation approach that focuses on both stockmarket and corporate worth.

Investment commentary

Global equity markets struggled in June against a background of growing trade tensions and further affirmation from policy makers that the days of easy money are behind us. UK equities followed the global trend with the FTSE All-Share generating a total return of -0.2% compared with -0.6% for the investment benchmark; the Fund generated a total return of -1.2% influenced by a poorer month for value investing.


The most significant positive contributor was Huntsworth, which was also the largest investment in the portfolio at the beginning of the month. Here, the increased focus of this public relations and marketing services business on the healthcare sector has led to improved financial performance, which has, in turn, been rewarded by a re-rating of the shares as they have caught the attention of the growth investor. Elsewhere, interim results from Urban&Civic were well received as the company demonstrated continued progress in its acquisition and subsequent development of strategic land for housebuilding. Finally, the absence of news did not prevent Eurocell and Speedy Hire generating double digit returns. In terms of detractors, Connect Group is the only one worthy of mention. The shares virtually halved over the month following an unscheduled trading update that indicated the expectation of materially reduced profits and a dividend cut. The board strategy of diversifying from the mature, but cash generative, newspaper distribution business through acquisition has been a failure. This event serves as a valuable reminder of the risks of corporate diversification. Focus on core competence and returning excess cash to shareholders is a useful bar to set company management.

Gearing

The Fund has a bank debt facility of £125m available for use as gearing by the Manager at any time. The net gearing/(liquidity) figure shown in the Key Fund information section indicates the percentage by which the total value of investments exceeds the total net assets.

Continuation vote & share buy-ins

The continuation of the Fund is voted on by shareholders at every 3^{rd} AGM. The next vote will occur at the AGM in March 2020.

Data sources & calculations

All data supplied by Aberforth, except NSCI (XIC) data (from Numis/Paul Marsh and Elroy Dimson – London Business School) and FTSE data (from FTSE International Limited).

Performance returns are total returns after all expenses and assume reinvestment of dividends. Yield is based on the Fund's trailing 12 months' dividends. Active share is a measure of how the Fund's portfolio differs from the NSCI (XIC). Small companies are represented by the NSCI (XIC). Large companies are represented by the FTAS.


