## **Objective**

The Fund's objective is to achieve a total return greater than that of the DNSCI (XIC) over the long term by investing in a diversified portfolio of small UK quoted companies.

# **Investment style: Value**

Aberforth are value investors who buy shares in companies that they calculate to be selling below their intrinsic value. This is determined through detailed financial and industrial analysis, combined with a valuation approach that focuses on both stockmarket and corporate worth.

#### Monthly investment commentary: July

UK equities outperformed global peer indices in July. The FTSE All-share rose 4.0%, with large caps leading the way. This was thanks in part to a stronger dollar boosting translated overseas earnings of the UK's biggest companies. While the value style was a general headwind to relative performance, inbound M&A interest in UK smaller companies continued to expose low starting valuations. The latter theme contributed to the 2.8% rise for the Fund. The benchmark DNSCI (XIC) was up 1.5%.

Leading the Fund's winners was **Just Group**, which announced a recommended offer from Brookfield Wealth Solutions at a 75% premium to the undisturbed share price. **Jupiter Fund Management's** acquisition of CCLA Investment Management, an asset manager focussed on serving non-profit organisations, was well received by the market. **International Personal Finance** disclosed it was subject to a possible offer for the business from a US-based specialty finance group. **Rank Group** continued its strong run of share price performance for the year after releasing a positive trading update. The company stands to benefit from the land-based casino reforms coming into force from July onwards.


**Foxtons** was among the weak Fund performers in the month. The group continues to benefit from strong performance in its Lettings business but is seeing overall performance held back by a still sluggish market for its Sales business. A recent capital markets event set out targets for an increase in operating profits to £50m over the medium term, more than double the current level. **Conduit** released a disappointing results update as it adapts its business in the reinsurance market under new senior management. Slower demand in its industrial end markets weighed on **Vesuvius**, which lowered profit expectations in an unscheduled trading update.



# **Gearing**

# Continuation vote & share buy-backs

The continuation of the Fund is voted on by shareholders at every  $3^{rd}$  AGM. The next vote will occur at the AGM in March 2026.
